



Mr. William A. “Bill” Kobren is Director, Logistics and Sustainment Center, at the Defense Acquisition University, Fort Belvoir, Virginia. He is responsible for development and currency of an integrated portfolio of multi-disciplinary life cycle logistics and product support learning assets at the University, including five classroom courses, eight distance learning courses, 44 continuous learning modules, and a host of web-based job support tools, communities of practice and related workflow learning resources. In addition to curricula development, training, and knowledge sharing, he also provides extensive mission assistance to the Office of the Secretary of Defense, the Military Components and Defense Agencies in the areas of logistics and product support policy, as well as life cycle logistics workforce human capital development. Bill has authored nearly two dozen published articles, spoken at a myriad of conferences, symposiums and workshops; and with nearly 1,400 posts since its 2009 launch, his DAU Director’s Blog is the most widely-read of any acquisition functional community.



Prior to joining DAU he served as both an aircraft and munitions maintenance officer, a logistics squadron commander, and logistician on multiple acquisition programs including the AIM-120 Advanced Medium Range Air-to-Air Missile (AMRAAM), F-35 Joint Strike Fighter, and a range of other munitions programs.

Mr. Kobren is a veteran of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. He is a member of the DoD Acquisition Corps and is DAWIA Level III certified in Life Cycle Logistics. He is an International Society of Logistics (SOLE) Certified Professional Logistician (CPL) and recipient of the SOLE Field Award for Outstanding Contributions in the field of Integrated Logistics Support. He also received the 2012 DoD Diminishing Manufacturing Sources and Material Shortages (DMSMS) Individual Achievement Award from the Office of the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Systems Engineering. Completing a dual concentration in supply chain management and the senior acquisition course, he was recipient of the U.S. Transportation Command Research and Writing Award, and was a Distinguished Graduate from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces (now the Dwight D. Eisenhower School for National Security and Resource Strategy) at the National Defense University.
